

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## Barbury Castle & Fyfield Down

Swallows swoop, a kestrel sits on steady air, buzzards and kites soar above and the jerky song flight of the whitethroat rings out from the hawthorn as we make our way towards the sixth century hillfort, Barbury Castle. Among the banks and ditches, rock-roses, common milkwort, a heath spotted orchid, marsh fritillaries enjoying the wild thyme and scores of burnet moths. The hoary plantain, its purple stamens giving the flower-head a reddish appearance, and the highly edible salad burnet harbour small copper and common blues and, on these chalk downs, the Adonis blue. Brown argus on the sage and tiny white flowers of the fairy flax. Skylarks sing, ascending above sheltered ditches and silky silverweed, small heath, dingy skipper, waves of whispering grass, saxifrage, a longhorn beetle, yellow shell moth, the red hues of campion and sorrel, swifts, house martins, a thick-headed fly.

A pause at The Ridgeway, Britain's oldest road, broomrape and a spear thistle lace bug. Two brimstones, a green hairstreak and a solitary red admiral open our account on Fyfield Down. A rapidly repeated note, sounding like a bunch of jangling keys: a corn bunting on top of a fence post. A

picture-winged fly on a spear thistle and a wall butterfly. Over Fyfield Down, as we make our return journey, in what is now searing heat, the buttercups gleaming gold under a cloudless, azure sky. A pair of speckled woods flirting and fluttering, a silver y moth, a fluorescent yellow spider, lady's bedstraw, field scabious and greater stitchwort.

## Hardwick Green Meadows

Chris Greensmith, WWT trustee and warden at Hardwick Green, introduced his talk with a 2017 clip from BBC Midlands Today about the floodplain meadows project at the site. We have lost 97% of lowland meadows (intensive farming, drainage, development, gravel extraction) since the 1940s. This small site of 20 hectares makes up almost 2% of what remains of floodplain meadows in the UK.

Chris has conducted detailed research and important conservation work at Hardwick Green for several years. He described three connecting areas, purchased by the Trust in 2018. Two water courses, Marsh Brook and Longdon Brook, flood every winter, leaving valuable deposits of river silt. Hay is harvested at the end of summer and cows graze on the aftermath until the water levels rise. This same pattern was followed on the meadows for centuries. Today, they support a diversity of wildlife.

Chris showed films from trail cameras and his own photographs revealing otters, badgers, a regular jay, yellowhammers, a kingfisher, hares, bats, a young deer and a variety of butterflies. Skylarks? Definitely heard but as yet unseen! Chris informed us that orchids have doubled in number – from one recorded last year to two this year! With the help of the National Lottery Heritage Fund and private donors, two new bridges have been built to assist access over the brooks and across the fields. During a break, John Denham described the work of the Hardwick Green Oral History Project. He played excerpts from field recordings made with local residents, some with reminiscences dating back to pre-war years.

Chris then got down to the technical stuff with graphs and charts aplenty! An important part of his research was to establish whether the floodplains at Hardwick Green could be classified as MG4 Meadow Grassland (Mesotrophic Grassland). This was established through detailed research into the site's hydrology and testing the water tables. He demonstrated the use of markers at 25 dipwell sites, established with the help of Worcester University students. Chris checks the dipwells regularly in all seasons and in weather ranging from stunning heat to finger-numbing cold!

There is still plenty to do on this long-term project with many unanswered questions relating to the unusually low water tables on the meadows, suggesting that the meadow's MG4 status is supported by soil impermeability as well as seasonal inundation. The focus of continuing conservation work: the preservation of valuable ecosystems, supporting pollination and carbon storage. Chris also credited the work of PIG (Plant Identification Group) in recording various species of plant life in the meadows, many of them increasingly rare.
