



Saving Worcestershire's Heathlands

It's been a while now since I came and spoke to you all about the Saving Worcestershire's Heathlands project and our grand plans on and off the new Dropping Well Farm nature reserve, so it's definitely time for an update!

I suppose the first update is that our project team has expanded and I am now joining forces with Joe, who some of you may know as our volunteer development officer, and Mary, one of our school sessional tutors and Kidderminster local. Joe is leading work on the reserve with our local young people, Mary is supporting Joe and leading outreach sessions in local schools whilst I am focusing my time in the communities bordering the heathland reserves. There has been a lot happening since I last saw you so I will focus this update on the last few months.

On the reserve. Joe has been busy hosting youth groups, schools and colleges with Kidderminster Youth Group (KDYT) visiting every other week during summer and Birchen Coppice School visiting every other week in term time.

Alongside that he has restarted the volunteer work parties, which are happening on the third Friday of every month. Recently, we have made some new connections with the Wyre Forest School and the Princes Trust team programme and we will be continuing to host Bewdley School's community service days this academic year.

In our local schools. Mary worked with Active Youth Outreach Services (AYOS) over the summer to deliver sessions to Stourport Primary, St. Mary's Primary and Birchen Coppice schools where they made heathland clay creatures covered in wildflower seeds to take home for their gardens. In term time, Mary will be visiting King Charles school every half-term to help them make their formal rose garden more wildlife-friendly, starting with their formal pond where animals often get stuck in and drown as there is no escape route.

In future we hope to deliver after-school and in-school sessions with more schools, including Birchen Coppice School, to reach the students who don't have the opportunity to come to the reserve.

In the community. I have been attending local events and setting up listening stations. Most recently, I've been able to facilitate actions for nature in the community around the reserves such as litter picking outside Birchen Coppice School, building a wildlife pond at St. Peters Church, judging a local wildlife gardening competition and supporting the creation of a community garden at the asylum seeker's hotel. We are also looking at several areas of land on the edge of the heathland reserves that provide important stepping stones/corridors for wildlife but which are currently being used for fly-tipping and/or lacking in biodiversity; we will be working with community housing, local residents and the Natural Networks team to restore the land for people and wildlife.

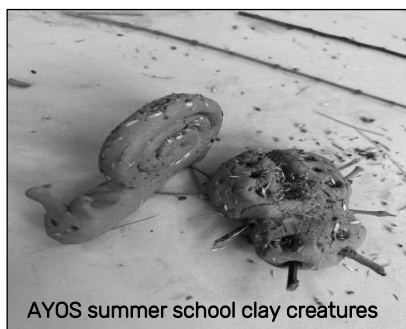
