The things you find...

Throughout the lockdown period, Chaddesley Woods has been exceptionally busy. On some weekend days I have seen as these messes. In some cases, this is passed many as 38 cars parked in the laybys. Surprisingly, and thankfully, this has not resulted in an increase in fly-tipping, although there has been an increase in chocolate wrappers and dog poo bags throughout the wood!

The exception was the discovery of dozens of small oranges dumped in a couple of the laybys. I can only imagine that someone had finished with a green grocery business and was left with oranges to dispose of. They have remained there, smashed to pulp, serving no purpose other than providing a little extra colour at an otherwise dull time of year. No doubt the person responsible felt part-justified, believing that the oranges might serve as food for wildlife...but UK woodland wildlife has no interest in them, I'm afraid.

Throughout the course of my books, reporting on the woods over many years, I have mentioned many of the things that I have discovered dumped. These include: a large white caravan, burned out cars, piles of asbestos sheets, tyres, magazines, builder's debris, cannabis grower's waste, a pile of dead rats and, on one occasion, a kitten in a box that I delivered to a pet rescue centre. One Christmas holiday I discovered a large box containing a turkey, oven-dressed and ready to cook. I hadn't bought my turkey at the time but certainly didn't consider profiting from my find - I hope the local wildlife had a great Christmas that year.

both wildlife and people, there is great time and effort from staff and volunteers at to clear up onto the local authorities, who use our taxes to deal with it, but otherwise it's the Trust's resources that take the hit.

Andy Harris, the Trust's member of staff responsible for Chaddesley Woods, told me "We welcome the increase in families visiting it's nice to see children enjoying the outdoors and wildlife. We just need to encourage people to stay to paths and take litter home. A big thank you to the few volunteers that have been able to help with access work and wardening."
