Wildlife and Farming Officer

General Information and Application Procedure

This is a full time (35 hours per week) permanent post.

The post is subject to the Trust's Terms and Conditions of Employment.

The appointment would be subject to an initial probationary period of six months.

A starting salary will be £23,000-£25,000 per annum depending on experience.

The Trust contributes to a Personal Pension scheme with Royal London under Auto-enrolment regulations. Employee contributions are deducted from monthly salaries, taking advantage of salary sacrifice provisions. Employees currently contribute 4% of salary and the Trust 8%. Employees may increase their contributions within HMRC limits.

Use of the post-holder's vehicle for business purposes is required for which a mileage rate, currently 45p a mile, is paid.

ABOUT WORCESTERSHIRE WILDLIFE TRUST

Worcestershire Wildlife Trust is an independent charity dedicated to the conservation of the wildlife and wild places in the county of Worcestershire. It was founded in 1968.

The Trust operates from Lower Smite Farm between Worcester and Droitwich. The listed farmhouse is used as offices, whilst the barns and outbuildings have been converted to provide workshops etc and a wildlife and farming centre which was opened to schools in 2004. The surrounding 150-acre farm is managed to promote wildlife within an economically viable system and is used by visiting school groups and the public. We have over 75 nature reserves across Worcestershire. Whilst individual staff members are responsible for leading in their area of responsibility and expertise, all staff are expected to contribute to delivery through inter-team co-operation.

The Trust has around 20,000 members who provide financial support through subscriptions and many of whom do much hard work on behalf of everyone who appreciates their environment and wildlife. It also relies heavily on grants, corporate support, legacies and donations from the public.

The Trust is governed by a Council of around 17 elected trustees. Council is responsible for overall strategy and policy. Implementation is led by the Director and a team of staff (currently 30). In all aspects of the Trust's work, the paid staff members are supported by several hundred regular volunteers. All staff and volunteers are ultimately accountable to the Council.

Worcestershire Wildlife Trust is one of 46 Wildlife Trusts who work together throughout the United Kingdom to form the largest voluntary organisation concerned with all aspect of wildlife conservation.
