Chaddesley Woods update

Winter woodland work will take place as usual over the coming months. This year it once again includes thinning of some deciduous woodland to allow more light to the woodland floor. We will also thin some areas of conifer as part of our continual conversion to native woodland. Our intention, however, is to keep some conifers as they help to demonstrate a phase in the history of the woodland. Finally, we will be carrying out more safety work on dying ash trees along paths and roads.
