# **Enjoy Your Garden**

I only have a small garden but when I start to count up the wildlife I share it with it's amazing. I can spend many an hour contemplating the different plants and animals - so much more fun than housework!

Near my garden I have some viper's bugloss, a wildflower given to me by a good friend this year; I will certainly get more next year as the bees love it. Mixed with cornflowers, cosmos, field scabious, teasels and evening primrose there is something for bees, butterflies moth and other insects.

This year my butterfly count included: orange tip, holly blue, comma, small tortoiseshell, red admiral, peacock, gatekeeper and just one white admiral, which disappeared before I could get my camera!

In my fence I have an old plum tree, more ivy than plum tree but the ivy flowers attract many bees and insects. It is also a perfect roosting place for sparrow, starling blue tit, great tit, robin and blackbird. These are regular visitors to the feeders where I have also seen dunnock, wren, pigeon and occasionally the local sparrowhawk who drops in for a meal!

Also in the garden I have a small pond. In spring it is full of croaking, spawning frogs, later leaving the garden full of tiny frogs, which I have to take care not to tread on. Dragonflies are also about.

Last but not least, for the last two years a hedgehog has been coming to feed in the garden. For it to get from garden to garden, my neighbour has lifted his fence a little. Speaking to other people locally they too have seen hedgehogs about and have kindly agreed to leave small gaps in fences. It is a great way to help this endangered creature and also a great way to meet the neighbours!

I hope that this shows how important and enjoyable gardens can be.

# Some Lockdown Observations

When lockdown began in March 2020 I decided to do a daily walk around the footpaths of Chaddesley and I have selected a few of my favourite bird observations.

One of my first migrants were wheatear, on passage north, in an area that I subsequently decided must be a migrant route because I also saw tree pipit, whitethroat, stonechat, reed bunting and others in the same area. One of the fields was planted with peas that, after harvest, was planted with a green manure crop of phacelia, wild radish and buckwheat. This seeded down and provides a wonderful food source for flocks (1000 or more) of chaffinch, greenfinch, linnet, brambling and – the star of the show - corn bunting, which aroused much interest. With these large numbers it attracted a merlin who had a feast. Brambling also featured at another site planted with sunflower for winter feed.

Throughout spring I had reports from several people about sightings of red kite but I never seemed to be in the right place at the right time. I was rewarded, very briefly, on 8<sup>th</sup> of July but I feel sure that they will become much more frequently seen in future years and may even nest in Chaddesley.

The cuckoo arrived on 23<sup>rd</sup> April 2020 and 28<sup>th</sup> April 2021 but his presence was only fleeting. After all the spring migrants had moved on or settled down to nesting, another highlight arrived in June. It is what I have come to call the" Kiss Me Quick" bird. I am referring to the quail whose call is just that to my ear. It is a very secretive bird of cornfields, seldom seen but its presence is made known by its distinctive call.

Just to end on a different species, I was surprised one morning to see two hares running around (but alas not boxing) soon to be joined by three more. A red-letter day!

This has highlighted a few sightings to be seen within three miles of Chaddesley church. My totals for 2020 were 73 bird species and for 2021 75 bird species.

Just last week I had a visit from two little egrets. The icing on the cake!
