A new venue

Eleanor Reast: Eades Meadow – its history, inhabitants and management. Eleanor is Reserves Officer for the Trust's eastern reserves.

Amphlett Hall is a single-storey building set back from Market Street behind a grassed area, between ASDA and St. John's Church (halfway up the private road to the church). The best car park is St. John Street pay and display (by Waitrose); it's free from 7pm. A limited number of parking spaces at the venue can be used by those with limited mobility and there is a disabled ramp for access to the building.

Nature reserves local to you

Many of you will be regular visitors to Upton Warren. Last year we were awarded funding from Natural England's Species Recovery Fund to restore some areas of this brilliant wetland reserve. The islands are an important refuge from predators for many waterfowl and wetland birds. However, they've been degraded by wave action so we've rebuilt them using specialist fencing to protect the edges from future erosion. Our Upton Warren volunteers are a powerhouse but this was even too much for them to take on! In November we welcomed a fleet of specialist amphibious diggers onto site to rebuild islands an remove reeds to create more open water. It won't be long before we see little ringed plovers using the newly stoned islands to nest on and the

first avocet of the year arrived back at The Flashes on February 11th - a sure sign that spring is on its way!

Spring is a great time to drop by Eades Meadow at our Foster's Green nature reserve near Hanbury. Come early May, it will be a sea of green-winged orchids and cowslips, with impressive mature oaks lining the old hedge boundary; wow! I'll be talking to your group in April about the meadow so if you'd like to know more about it then do come along.
