Seasonal nature words

KS1

Habitat	ha-bee-tat	The natural home of an animal, plant or other creature.
Season	see-zon	Our year is divided into four seasons which are marked by their weather patterns and daylight hours. The four seasons are spring, summer, autumn and winter.

KS2

Invertebrate	in-vur-ti-brut	An animal that doesn't have a backbone. Animals like beetles and butterflies are invertebrates.
Migration	my-gray-shun	A movement from one place to another, which usually happens as the seasons change. Animals migrate to find better places to raise their young, to avoid bad weather or to find food. In the UK most migration happens in the spring and autumn.

Go for a wellbeing nature walk



Why not get outside with your class and go for a wellbeing nature walk in your school grounds. Breathe deeply and take time to take in the view, listen to the sounds and feel the breeze. You could take the [garden bird detective spotter sheet](#) with you to identify any birds you see and you could also download and use the Merlin App to identify any birds you hear singing.

Ideas for once back inside

• Literacy and writing skills

Students can use their new knowledge as inspiration for non-fiction writing on one of the species they identified - researching appearance, diet, habitat and other interesting facts.

• Art

Students can create a picture, collage or painting of their favourite identified species.

Craft ideas

It is always a treat when you can see the birds outside the classroom window.

An easy and fun activity that can give the students a sense of ownership in helping wildlife is creating bird silhouettes to protect our feathered friends from colliding with the windows, helping to keep them safe for the season to come. Check out our [how to help birds avoid windows](#) activity.

How to help birds avoid windows



You will need:

- card
- black marker pen
- scissors
- thread or fishing line
- suction cup, blu-tack or duct tape

You can find these on most shower puffs.

1 Sketch a large bird shape on your card, and colour it in with your black pen. Cut it out.

2 Make a small hole in the top of the bird and tie it onto a short thread.

3 Hang the bird outside a window to break up reflections on the glass. It will also move in the wind.

Some shapes to try:

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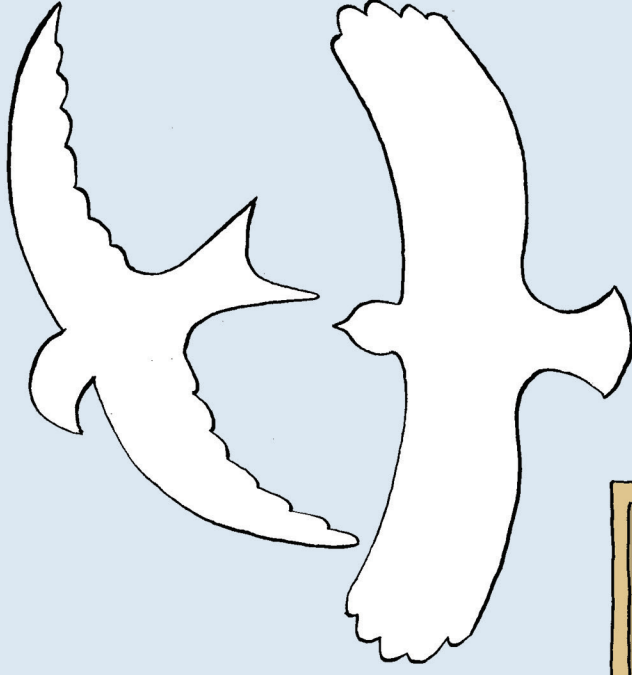
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Some shapes to try:
